**Przemysław Adamczewski** is an Associate Professor, a Caucasologist and a graduate of Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań. His research interests focus on the Caucasus region and its relations with Poland from political science and historical perspective. In the Institute of Political Studies, PAS, he heads the Richard Pipes Laboratory.

Andrzej Paczkowski is a professor, historian and graduate of Warsaw University. His research is focused on the history of Poland in 20<sup>th</sup> century. He is an author of many monographs, including *The Spring Will Be Ours. Poland and the Poles from Occupation to Freedom* (2003) and *Revolution and Counterrevolution in Poland, 1980–1989* (2015) and a publisher of many collections of archive documents. In the period 1999–2016 he was a member of the Council of the Institute of National Remembrance.

**Krzysztof Persak** is a historian and a graduate of Warsaw University and Graduate School for Social Research at the Institute of Philosophy and Sociology, PAS.
